I invite you to be part of the Centennial by attending an event, volunteering for the park or becoming a member!



Upper St. Anthony Falls Lock & Dam

Starting this summer the National Park Service will be operating the visitor center at the Upper St. Anthony Falls Lock and Dam. Located at the west end of the iconic Stone Arch Bridge, the visitor center overlooks St. Anthony Falls. Stop by to get a close-up look at the tallest lock on the entire Mississippi!

After Congress closed the lock to navigation last summer, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers asked if the park would manage its visitor center. Of course, we said yes. The partnership between the corps and the National Park Service will keep the lock and dam observation area open, provide tours of the lock, and open the restrooms to the public.

The visitor center will be open seven days a week from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend, from 9:30 am to 5:00 pm. Visitors will be welcome to visit the observation deck any time or take a scheduled formal tour.

Summer is a Great Time to Learn Outside the Classroom!

One of our favorite things about spring and summer is watching the park come alive in new ways. There is so much to explore in these warmer months: What kind of trees grow near the river? How do we know what mussels are in the river? How can I learn about birds or how to fish?

Such joyful curiosity comes naturally to youth when exploring the park. Tapping into this curiosity is a great way to engage our younger visitors and teach them about the river. There are many opportunities for volunteers to encourage and assist learners in our riparian classroom. Volunteers help kids learn how to navigate their way using a compass, how to fish for the first time, or understand the implications of climate change.

One example is a partnership between the YMCA and the National Park Service called the Let's MOVE! Outside Initiative, which empowers youth to discover and create new outdoor opportunities for play, learning, and service. YMCA campers earn a junior ranger badge and experience firsthand the motto of "Explore, Learn, and Protect." Campers canoe on the Mississippi River, volunteer in a national park, and work with a park ranger!

Like many of us, I love my job, but it involves a fair amount of time sitting in front of a computer throughout the day. Volunteering for the National Park Service allows me


the opportunity to unplug, get outside, and help others get back to nature themselves.

BioBlitz at Coldwater Spring

We usually hear the word "biodiversity" in regard to rainforests with their vast number of species. Yet the diversity of life in our own backyards is phenomenal. We take for granted clean water, fertile soil, and air to breathe, yet these are all the result of working ecosystems filled with species that perform these tasks.

From fall 2011 to fall 2012, the National Park Service demolished a dozen abandoned Bureau of Mines buildings at Coldwater Spring. Since then the National Park Service, Mississippi Park Connection, and hundreds of volunteers have been working to create a natural park. This year's BioBlitz will inform us about changes in numbers and species of fish, fungi, insects, birds, and plants living within the 29 acres of Coldwater and surrounding parkland and riverfront. The baseline for this information came from our first BioBlitz on the property, which was held in spring 2013, shortly after demolition was completed.

BioBlitz is an intensive 24-hour sweeping scientific survey of biodiversity in which the public helps scientists find all the plants and animals at a specific location. Part contest, part festival, part educational event, and part scientific endeavor, BioBlitz brings together participants from across the state in a race against time.



Volunteers assist BioBlitz scientists using sonar detectors, bug lights, fish traps and live traps to count and chronicle the area's flora and fauna. All ages and skill levels can take part to collect plants and insects and live-trap animals, which are identified before being released back into the wild. Come be part of a group of dedicated scientists and volunteers roaming the park, equipped with all kinds of gear, from binoculars and bird nets to small mammal traps and mushroom baskets.

The National Park Service, Mississippi Park Connection, and the Bell Museum of Natural History are all working together to organize this year's BioBlitz on July 15 & 16 at Coldwater Spring.
